FOR RETAIL THERAPY Highland Park "I love how friendly we are. Texans are really friendly, down-to-earth people," exclaims Kelly Frye, her drawl faded after years of living in Los Angeles. She also counts the local food as one of the biggest reasons she returns to the Lone Star State every chance she can. "I absolutely have to go to certain places when I'm horne, like Goode Company Barbeque! Every Thanlogiving and Christmas, we have to pick up pecan pie and checolate pie from there. I also go with my stepdad to Lure Tortilla and we share the bef filiation.

As the only girl among five siblings, attending Rockets games ranks high among her favorite Houston activities. Growing up with all boys also meant Frye was well-versed in comics, knowledge that she is applying to her most recent role on the much-buzzed-about TV version of DC Comics' The Flash. "My oldest brother Jason is a huge comic book fan—specifically a huge DC Comics fan," Frye explains. When she told him she'd landed the part of Bette Sanz Sosoci (aka Plastique), a bomb disposal expert whose alter ego has the power to blow up any object she touches, "He totally freaked out, and screamed, 'My little sister is going to be Plastique!" He remembered riding his bike into West University's Rice Village to buy the comic when Plastique first appeared, the day it came out!"

Behind the fantasy. Plastique's story is complex. "She's described in the comic books as a super-villainess, but you see in her first episode [which aired in November] that she's actually not so bad," explains Fryx. "She just can't control her powers and she's just trying to get away from General Elling, who is attempting to capture her and use her at a weapon... The general actually ends up shooting her. As of now, Plastique is at the bottom of the ocean. When she comes back [later this season], we'll see if this morphed her into a super-villainess, as she is in the comic books, or if she'll still be a good person."

Whether good or evil, Plustique will always

be a strong female character, one that Frye thinks the's well-equipped to play, given her experience "growing up surrounded by so many strong women. Texas breeds strong women and I had great role models everywhere I turned," she says. "My mom is a peretty amazing womens. She was a full-time real extate agent and a full-time mother of five, and she did a great job. All five of us children have gone on to puture our dreams. She pushed us never to settle and told us we could do whatever we pur our minds to. She is a living impiration."

Another strong female role model, her golf coach, Janis Balsamo, "was always so good at celebrating people's ettengths and not highlighting their weaknesses. I try to do that in my life."

Although Frye is not the first member of her family to go into show biz-her playwright brother, Jason, founded Houston's wildly successful Catastrophic Theatre-acting wasn't her goal when she first came to L.A. to study international business law. "I was planning on being a lawyer," she confides. "But I had one of those moments that you have in life where you say. 'Am I going to try this out professionally and see if I can do it? I jumped off the cliff and I was hoping the parachate would open. And it did." Among her first TV credits were guest-starring. spots on CBS's NCIS Los Angeles and The Montalist, as well as FOX's short-lived comedydrama Roke, opposite Greg Kinneaz. "He is a master class in acting, in my opinion, and he's so warm and friendly," she says of Kinneaz.

As her own star rises, Frye is staying true to ber Texas-style warmth and positive aträude. 'It all boils down to not being afraid,' the says, adding, that her role models 'never allowed fear to get in the way of their lives. They lead with lown do that a try to do in my life.' And as she burtles the forcest comic book characters imaginable, she's certainly doing her home atten pound. **





degree from Lovola Marymount University, Kelly Frye made the decision to try her hand at acting professionally, something she said she always had an interest in thanks to her love for storytelling. With support from friends and family, Frye made the leap, and since starting, she has made appearances in shows such as Rake and The Mentalist, and she participated in a staged reading at the 2014 Sloan Film Summit in November. She also recently joined the DC world as Plastique on episode five of The CW's The Flash, which premiered October 7.

When she's not auditioning. working, or spending time with family, she's trying to visit as many places around the world as she can. But don't make her try to pick a favorite place; she loves many countries for multiple reasons.

Frye chatted with Cliché about ultimately deciding to act professionally, joining the DC world, what shows she's obsessed with, her love of new culturesshe spoke Spanish before English and studied French and Japanese in collegeand her passion for traveling.

Cliché: How'd you go from business to acting?

Kelly Frye: I come from a family filled with storytellers. My mom is one of the best, and my oldest brother is actually a playwright, theater director, and founder of the Catastrophic Theatre in Houston. But, I've always performed. I was a figure skater, too. In the back of my mind, I had always wanted to do this. The sensible part of my brain thought I needed to be a lawyer, so I went to school for business. Then I had a conversation with myself and my family and asked them what they thought. They agreed with me and told me that I only have one life, so I might as well try it. Thankfully, it's worked out, and I knew if it didn't, I could go back and still be fine. I love it, though, It's really fun to inhabit another person.

How was it coming into the comic universe?

It was amazing! The people involved are so fantastic and wonderful. Everyone-the actors, producers, creators-is amazing. And when I learned more about Plastique, I just fell in love with her. She is such a badass.



Before the role in The Flash, were you a fan of the DC universe?

My oldest brother is a DC fan. When he was younger, he thought he was Batman, which is hilarious, but because of it, I was around comic books. I wasn't reading comic books though. I have learned that there are a number of strong, female characters, which I am all about in terms of both watching them and playing them. After I got the role, I got a tour of DC Comics and got to learn so much about this world. I am being exposed to these women that have been around for decades, and I'm so excited.

Aside from the tour, did you do any research on your own?

Yes. When I was going in for the role, I called my oldest brother, and he gave me a brief history. He remembered riding his bike and picking up the issue when she first appeared in Firestorm in 1982. It was neat hearing his take. I also did research online, but it is a little more different in the show than in the comics, so I stuck to the pages they gave me. What is cool about her in the show is that she has a military background. Brooke, one of the writers, had a military background, and she was in Vancouver with me. It was amazing having her there, because it was like I had this encyclopedia sitting with me. I could go and ask her questions about the military jargon and such. I wanted to make sure I was doing that world and the comic book world justice.

Do you have a favorite superhero?

Oh my gosh. Well, of course I love Plastique, but when I was going through DC Comics and looking at everything, I saw Batwoman on somebody's desk, and I thought if I was going to dress up as someone. I would be her. She has this great red hair and red boots and a red insignia and looks awesome. But she's also so strong. She's [the figurine] now sitting on my desk, and she is my inspiration for the day.

What do you love to do for fun when you're not working?

I love my family, and they are mostly in Houston, so I like to visit them. I also have one brother in Washington, DC. I like to travel a lot. If I have time off, and I'm not busy with work or auditions, that's what I'm doing.

What about your favorite place?

Oh, Laos! But I love Paris and Hawaii, too. Oh, but wait—Tokyo. It is so different than anything I have ever known. I unfortunately didn't get to spend a lot of time there, so I want to go back and at least spend two weeks in Japan. I have been so fortunate. I know a lot of Americans don't get to travel, but my family has always been into traveling. It's in my blood. If I have extra money and time, I book a flight and just go somewhere new. It's something great to spend your money on.

Do you have a dream show you would love to be a part of?

The Good Wife. I think Julianna Margulies is brilliant. I am hardly ever able to watch shows in real time, so I consistently have three shows on my DVR. That one, Game of Thrones, and Downton Abbey. I can't get enough of those. Also, You're the Worst on FX is so funny.

What's next for you?

There are lots of auditions right now. And I'm just excited to watch The Flash and see Plastique come to life. I hope the fans like her and respond to her. I'm so excited to get to be a part of this world. The fans are so great and the video games and the movies are fantastic. I just keep pinching myself because I get to be a part of it.

ació en Houston hace 30 años y dice que creció en la misma casa que un superhéroe: un bermano mayor que desde niño se preocupó por ayudar a los demás y hoy es abogado en Washington D.C.

Aunque siempre se sintió a gusto en su entorno familiar, Kelly Frye dejó su hogar para estudiar en Los Ángeles. Hoy me platica que

extraña a sus hermanos y a sus pudres, pero que logró separarse de ellos porque siempre ha sido una major independiente y le ha gustado viajar desde pequeña.

La pelirroja no estudió actuación, sino Negocios Internacionales. Antes fue atleta (patinadora durante una década y coredora por otro tanto), pero siempre legustó actuar. Participaba en obras de teatro de la escuela y desde entonces le hipnotialo la posibilidad de conectarse con la audiencia. La única razón por la que no estudió teatro desde el principio fue por su destreza con los números. A diferencia de todas las actrices que dicen que siempre odiaron la escuela, Kelly Frye era buena para las matemáticas.

Durante su último año universitario decidió probas suerte en los escenarios. La experiencia le escantó, su família la apoyó y ahora todos se reúnen para verla sentana a semana cuando se transenite. The Flash, una serie inspirada en el cómic homónimo que retrata la vida de un científico que se vuelve absurdamente veloz tras sufrir un accidente y ser alcanzado poe un rayo. Desde Los Ángeles, esta guapa texana nos dijo más al respecto.

LSQUIRE: Cuéntame sobre tu personaje en The Flash.

You were recently cast as Bette Sans Souci aka Plastique on The CW's The Flash. Playing a bomb disposal expert in Iraq, what kind of research did you do to prepare yourself for the role?

My oldest brother, Jason, is a huge DC Comics fan, When I told him about booking Plastique he said, "I can't believe MY little sister is going to be PLASTIQUE!" I made sure to learn as much about the original character as I could before filming to make DC Comic fans proud, especially my brother. Plastique in the TV show is different from Plastique in the comics. I think people are really going to like her. The writers did an awesome job adapting the character to fit into the world of the show. Plastique has a military background on the show and one of the writers. Brooke Eikmeier, was in the army herself. She was able to give me great advice on set.

Growing up with brothers, were you yourself exposed to comic books as a child? Did you have a favorite?

Comic book characters actually came to life in my home. My brothers created stories about their favorite characters and put on productions all the time. Jason always played Batman and I always wanted to be Batgirl. I definitely knew a lot more about Batman and The Beatles than any of my friends at school. The benefits of having older brothers.

As Plastique, your superpower is turning objects into weapons. That has to come in handy. If you could have any superpower in real life, what would it be?

You know. I've been thinking about that a lot. It would be incredible to be fast like The Flash or to be able to create explosives by just touching an object like Plastique, but I've always wanted to fly. What an incredible feeling to take off and soar through the sky whenever you want. Yeah, my superpower would be flight.

Touching on your other roles, you also recently worked on the Fox series Rake alongside Greg Kinnear. Can you tell us a little more about your role as Cindy?

Cindy Beck was a load of fun to play. She was really smart, sassy, wore fab clothes and got frisky with Greg Kinnear's character, Keegan Deane. That job was fantastic on so many levels. On Rake, Cindy was Keegan Deane's new assistant at Leon & Associates. Keegan wasn't too sure about working there until he met Cindy and got the run-down of all the perks of working for the company. When coming to the law firm, Keegan already had an assistant, Leanne, played by the amazing Tara Summers. Tara's character and my character got to but heads a few, times. Playing Cindy was a great way to kick off 2014.

What has been your most memorable role to date, and what is your dream role?

I've had the chance to be a part of quite a few great productions, but joining The Flash has been the most exciting. The opportunity to be a part of a show of this magnitude and to see the audience's reaction from the

beginning has been an amazing gift. The whole Flash experience has been magical for me. To get to play a kick ass, strong woman has always been a dream of mine. I get to play my kick ass, strong woman in the DC Comics Universe as a metahuman! Pretty memorable!

Plastique would be any actress's dream role, and I get to be the one chosen to play her! I hope to continue playing strong, kick ass women for the rest of my career. I love watching strong female characters and I love playing them. Another dream would be to work with Charlie Kaufman. I love his movies and working with him has been on my wish list for as long as I can remember.



You are an inspiration to many young women and aspiring actors who want to play strong roles. How do you stay inspired and motivated?

My mom is a strong woman herself, a constant inspiration and a great motivator. She gave my brothers and me the confidence to go after what we want in life. When my own confidence wavers. I call and ask her to tell me a few magic stories from our life. I call them "magic stories" because they tend to be situations where fate has played a heavy hand. She's a wonderful storyteller and they always lift my spirits and remind me that what is meant to be will be. I attribute my ability to go after what I want completely to my mom. I surround myself with likeminded people and they motivate me every day in their pursuit of their dreams. It's never easy, but nothing worth having ever is.

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






If you haven't heard of Kelly Frye yet, commit her name to memory now. The on-the-rise actress and Texas native only just arrived on the scene, but judging by how fast she booked the role of Sgt. Bette Sans Souci (a.k.a. Plastique) on The CW's new show, The Flash, we've got a feeling you'll be seeing a lot more of her soon enough.

Though we don't know any reveals regarding Plastique's story arc, we do know that her character is a former bomb specialist who has the ability to turn any object into an explosive just by touching it - which we're assuming will make her an invaluable member of The Flash's team. As for Frye herself? Well, aside from her striking features and upbeat attitude, the former model also used to compete in both high school tennis and golf

at the state level. In other words, she's practically superhuman in real life, as well.

To celebrate Plastique's debut episode tomorrow night, we challenged MAC Cosmetics Director of Makeup Artistry Gregory Arlt to show us three complete looks that you can achieve in a, ahem, flash. The result? Well, go ahead and see for yourself.



The All Day, Every Day

Using a blush brush, gently tap the powder on the apples of your cheeks. Arlt's tip for making sure you hit the right spot? Smile! Sure, it might feel awkward to smile at yourself in the mirror, but it's the best way to ensure you're applying to the apple of both cheeks and distributing an equal amount of blush on each side. Add a touch of eyeshadow in a muted metallic just above your lids and below your brow bone to open the eyes.



Top the whole thing off with a natural-hued, glossy lip, and you're out the door!

If you think applying a thick, opaque, bright lipstick requires a chunk of time for trial and error, we're right there with you — until now, that is. To achieve the look in less than two minutes, Arlt suggests using a small lip brush instead of attempting to put the lipstick on directly from the tube, and applying only to the center of your bottom lip. Next, gently rub your lips together, which will allow for a thin, even coat across your lips. Repeat one or two more times for a highly-pigmented look.

Finally, to really make them pop, lightly outline your lips with a liner that matches the lipstick.

The Sultry Eye...On The Fly
Come hither, easy eyeliner technique!



For a not-too-thick — but, not-too-perfect — line, Arlt recommends a connect-the-dots technique. First, using a black kohl eyeliner pencil, make four light dots right at your lash line. Then, simply connect the dots, creating a thin even line. Next, use your finger to lightly smudge the line.

Finally, apply two coats of your favorite jetblack mascara. Arlt recommends coating the bottom lashes *before* the top, which helps to avoid unwanted mascara marks under your eyes after you blink.





The Flash Hits Highest Rating Since Premiere In Live +3



The Flash continues to run strong in the ratings, reaching its highest rating in the Live +3 viewing category since the premiere.

As The CW announced yesterday, *The Flash's* delayed viewings for last week's episode, "Plastique," spike by 58% in total viewers compared to Live and Same Day viewings. With a gain of more than 2 millions viewers, "Plastique" became *The Flash's* most-watched installment since its sophomore episode, "Fastest Man Alive." Even bigger however, is the series' 55% jump in the +A18-34 category, from 1.2 to 1.85 million, giving the Flash its highest rating yet since its pilot episode in October. And finally, *The Flash* was also the highest rated broadcast show last Tuesday, November 11th, with a 73% rise in in the M18-34 category.

The numbers certainly make sense, given that "Plastique" was one of the series' most discussed episodes yet. Headlined by a major tease for Gorilla Grodd, one of *The Flash's* most popular rogues, the episode also enjoyed guest appearances by DC Comics stalwarts General Eiling (who will eventually become the brutish villain, "The General) and Plastique.

The Flash stars Grant Gustin as Barry Allen and the Flash. The next episode, "The Flash Is Born," airs this Wednesday, November 19 at 8:00 p.m. ET/PT on The CW.



The Flash's Plastique Previews Her Explosive Debut and [Spoiler]'s Crush

This Tuesday on *The Flash* (The CW, 8/7c), Barry and the S.T.A.R. Labs team meet Bette Sans Souci, a metahuman who is not innately villainous, but whose "explosive" talent is at risk of being weaponized by the very military she once served.

Explaining her character's origin, Kelly Frye (*Rake, The Mentalist*) tells TVLine, "Bette was in Afghanistan defusing roadside bombs when an explosion left shrapnel inside her body." The war vet was then transported back to the States... just as S.T.A.R. Labs' particle accelerator began accidentally (?) going haywire. As a result, "The same explosion that caused The Flash to get his powers gave Bette her ability."

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Specifically, Bette can turn any object into a bomb just with her touch — a lesson Barry learns when she unintentionally sets his costume to combust, forcing the poor lad to strip down and be left buck naked (as seen in a promo). "That was pretty cool," the actress recalls with a laugh. But lest you think Barry will add yet

another crush to his list, it's a different S.T.A.R. Labs superstar whose fuse is lit by the fiery newcomer. "There may be a little something between Cisco and me...," Frye teases, adding that the tech whiz's christening of her as "Plastique" is "a really cute part of the episode."

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When Barry & Co. first get wind of the volatile new metahuman in their midst, they of course fear the worst, only to realize that Bette wishes not to exploit her ability, let alone allow General Wade Eiling (played by *Sleepy Hollow's* Clancy Brown) use it for his black op squad's nefarious purposes. "He is trying to get a hold of me, to use me as a weapon," Frye shares. "He wants what I've got!"

Frye counts working alongside Clancy, an actor of many and varied credits, among the highlights of her Flash experience. ("He's super-cool, and such a presence," she notes.) There was also some nifty underwater stunt work involved and, yes, most likely a Nicolas Cage-style "Walk Away from an Explosion in Slo-Mo" moment for her character. But the actress also found a



certain honor in serving as somewhat of an avatar for Brooke Eikmeier, who penned the episode (with Aaron and Todd Helbing).

"Brooke is a strong female like Bette Sans Souci. And like Bette, she was in the army, as a cryptolinguistics specialist," Frye reports. "I got her whole story while on set, and it's pretty amazing."

All told, Frye hails the freshman drama's cast and crew as "so professional, so talented and so cool," including but far from limited to Candice Patton, who like Frye hails from the Lone Star State. "It's a really great group," she says, "and I hope they get to do this show for a long time."

'The Flash's' Plastique is different from the comics, but she's still a 'supervillainess'



With the return of "The Flash" after a one week break, comes a DC Comics supervillain to oppose our speedy hero. Rather, a supervillainess.

Kelly Frye plays the title character in the episode "Plastique," a metahuman who has the power to turn just about anything into a bomb. While her character in the comics is on the evil side of the fight, "The Flash" is giving the character a bit of a different spin.

Is there any hope of her aligning with the Flash, though? Frye spoke to Zap2it about the changes Plastique's character went through for the series and whether or not she has a future on the show.

Those who know the DC universe well know who Plastique is, but who is she on "The Flash"?

Well, Plastique in the comics is a bit different from Plastique on the TV show. On "The Flash," she's actually part of the army. She was diffusing roadside bombs in Afghanistan when an explosion went off that caused shrapnel to get in her body. That's when she was flown stateside to Central City. When the [particle accelerator] explosion went off that gave The Flash his powers, I get my powers.

That's a cool new take on her.

It is pretty cool. I'm so excited I get to play her. The best part about it is the woman who wrote Plastique on the TV show, Brooke Eikmeler, is former military. She was in the army. How cool is that?

If ever there was going to be someone to write that part ...

She's the perfect person! She was on set with me the whole time, in Vancouver together for two weeks. There were moments where I'd say lines that were a little bit more military jargon and I'd pop over to her and say, "Hey Brooke, would you say the line like this?"

I just had this wealth of information sitting right in front of me so I used it. She was a great source of military knowledge.

Since Plastique is changing from the comics, who is she siding with? She's normally a villain. The teasers for the episode make it seem like it could go either way, though.

Well, we just don't know. I don't think I can say whether she's good or bad. But, I have to say, I love the term supervillainess. How cool is that?

There really is no better thing you could be called.

Right? I was like, 'I get to be called supervillainess? Okay!' I put that on my Twitter.

Did you go back into the comics at all to learn about the original Plastique?

I happen to have a good resource right in my family. My oldest brother is a huge DC Comics fan. Big time. When he was a little boy, he actually thought he was Batman.

He sleepwalks and one night he was sleepwalking and he jumped off the landing on the staircase thinking he could fly. Thinking he was Batman.

Was he okay?

I think he was fine. He probably broke his arm or something, but little kids heal quickly. I broke so many bones when I was a kid. I had four brothers, so I was such a tomboy.

So Jason, my oldest brother, when I was going out for this role I was like, "Jason, I'm going to audition for the role of Plastique" and I asked him, "Do you know anything about her?" Before I could finish my question he was like, "Oh my God, I just read Plastique was going to appear on the TV show on the message board. I can't believe you're auditioning for it."

I got a little background on her from him, then I knew she was a little different from the comic books. I knew her story from the script and I knew what he had told me about Plastique.

I'm excited because I get to have powers. There's all these cool special effects and visual effects and she's such a bada** woman, which I'm all about. It's definitely an exciting role. Everybody in my family is stoked.

Hopefully this isn't the end for her. So far they're building this great rogue's gallery of villains to go back to. If it's all building to an eventual super-powered showdown, that would be incredible.

I hope so. [laughs] My brothers said to me, "Does this mean there's going to be a Plastique show? Are you going to get a spinoff?" I was like, 'Alright guys, let's not get ahead of ourselves here. Let's just be really excited that I'm on 'The Flash.'"

You never know, it could happen.

It's true, it could happen. And the DC universe is huge. I'm learning so much about the comic book world. Which, by the way, I love. I feel like the people in the comic book world are so fun. They're so fun and excited about what they do, excited about characters and story. They're so passionate about these worlds that are created.

The fans are pretty passionate too and can't wait to see how the episode turned out. Uh, me too!

And fingers are crossed that Plastique comes back again. You might not be in charge of that, but find a way to make it happen.

I am doing my best. I'm doing everything in my power to make sure I'm on that show for a long time.

'The Flash': Kelly Frye 'really excited' to join the CW hit as villain Plastique

The Flash is one of the most buzzed-about new shows of the TV season. So when Kelly Frye had the opportunity to audition for the role of Bette Sans Souci, alias the villain Plastique, her reaction was one of "Extreme excitement," she told us in our interview last week. "I'm one of five children, I have four brothers, and my oldest brother Jason, he goes on two message boards online. One is for the Houston Rockets and the other is for DC Comics. "Before I even auditioned for this...people were very excited about it. Then I auditioned for it, [and] I told my brother that I had auditioned [and] he goes 'Oh my God, that's so cool.' And then when I booked it, he went through the roof!"

She's clearly got her geek credentials, but she didn't have to be an expert when she snagged the role. "It's different from the Plastique in the comic books," Kelly explained. "She still has that same power where things that she touch turn into bombs, but she has a different background. She's a bomb specialist in the Army. What's neat about this episode is the cowriter of this episode, Brooke Eikmeyer, was in the Army. She was on set...and I got some really great tips from her."

Considering that tonight's *Flash* episode is called "Plastique," did playing the title character add any pressure onto Kelly's shoulders? "The pressure came from doing this character justice," she said. "It's doing her and her hustory justice, because I know she's a big deal. My brother was so excited about it, because he was excited about the character. I wanted to make sure everything we did with her, did her justice. She's been around since 1982 - longer than I've been on this earth."

"I got to do some really cool stunt work, which was my first time doing stuff like that," she continued. "I had a squib, which is when there's a gunshot there's this little explosive device inside of your clothing that goes off and it puffs out dust or blood or something, and that was so cool. I got to do this water stunt, where there's an underwater camera and I'm falling into the water.

"Working with that group, [executive producers] Andrew Kreisberg and Greg Berlanti and Brooke, the three of them are just dreams to work with," Kelly added. "Greg is like the king of television right now. And Andrew, who was on set for a little while, is such a fan of this world and so passionate, and you see that in his work."

Plastique is the latest character that she's delighted in playing; TV audiences have no shortage of opportunities to check Kelly out in other entertaining roles. "Unfortunately, Rake did not get renewed for a second season. My character in it was, she was fun. She was a blast to play," said the actress, who appeared in three episodes of the Greg Kinnear comedy as Cindy Beck, and has also turned up in Anger Management, NCIS: Los Angeles and House. "And that's what I've been getting recently. All these characters that have been a blast to play." What are her favorite shows? "The Good Wife. I'm obsessed with The Good Wife. It's the best network television there is. Julianna Margulies, she's such an amazing actress. She's strong and vulnerable and the fact that she could carry 22 episodes like that - she blows my mind," she enthused. "And You're The Worst. It's so unique, so funny."

But tonight, she'll be tuned into *The Flash*, and enjoying the fact that she got to portray a memorable comic book villain in Plastique. "I'm really excited to be a part of this show," Kelly told us, "and the beginning of the show." Hopefully, this won't be the last time that she graces - or is that menaces? - Central City.
